
3rd Sunday of Advent

In this day and age, we could indeed act upon Jesus' words to "go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised" (Mt 11:4-5). These very things are happening today in hospitals and clinics all over the world. The miracles of Jesus take place each and every day.

Simple cataract surgery restored sight to many elderly people. Innovations in artificial limbs made it possible for even severely injured veterans who were amputees to be able to walk again. Hansen's disease (leprosy) has been almost completely eliminated, and those who had been considered modern day lepers—people infected with HIV—have been given a new lease on life with modern drugs. Cochlear implants make it possible for many who had become deaf to be able to hear again. And the stories about people who are saved because of automatic defibrillators are recounted almost weekly in the media

There is one more thing that Jesus told John's disciples that they should recount to him: the poor have the good news proclaimed to them. There are lots of opportunities for Christians to bring good news to the poor during this time of year. But proclaiming good news is about more than a check. It also means working with organizations that are trying to alleviate poverty. We're not all qualified to be physicians who work the miracles of healing, but we can work the miracle of ending poverty through our advocacy for the poor.

<u>REFLECTIONS FROM</u> FATHER CHARLES SHEEHY

In one way or other we are blessed with special friends. St. Paul needed only seven words to express his life in Christ: "The love of Christ urges us on." Once Paul found Jesus Christ, he had the perfect friend.

In his letter to the Ephesians Paul speaks of our unity in Christ. There is only one Jesus Christ. He gave Himself up for us. The love Christ has is extensive, offered to all who will accept it.

When a person offers us a gift, it is to show their love for us. When they find that we are very pleased with it, they see it, in a certain sense, as theirs also.

Jesus Christ first knew of Paul as the bitter enemy of all who were friends of Christ. Jesus spoke to the persecutor Saul, soon to become Paul, and the terrible persecutor became a dedicated follower of Jesus. Once Paul realized the life of Christ, and His giving of Himself, the enemy of the people of Christ became the great friend.

The Church has twenty-one letters of Paul, all helping us to love Christ.
